Friday, **April 24** starting at 4 p.m., doors open and this night is reserved for Friends of the Library members only. Dealers who are also members may attend, but their purchases must be personal use and not profit. We ask that scanners <u>not</u> be used on this day.


On Saturday, **April 25** starting at 10 a.m., the public is welcome to attend the used book sale. Book prices range from \$1 to \$2.50. There are non-book items, such as DVDs and CDs, as well as collectibles and vintage books are priced separately.

Sunday, **April 26** at 11 a.m., "Bag Sale Day" begins. Prices will be fixed according to the size of the bag or container. Reusable or oversize bags will be priced differently than the normal plastic grocery-style bag which is \$5. <u>Buyers should plan to bring their own bags or boxes</u>.

Children 12 years of age and younger attending the sale are able to select a free book of their choice from the Children's Area. Children's book prices range from \$.50 to \$1.

The library is here to help. With your library card you can now access Universal Class, which includes more than 500 online Continuing Education courses on topics such as bookkeeping, marketing, web design, dog training and more. The library also added Zinio, which provides full-text subscriptions to 40 popular magazines, which you can download and read at your leisure. Safari *Books* is now available for people looking for up-to-date advanced computing books. The Safari collection contains over 500 titles that are available on demand. They can be read on any computer or tablet with an Internet connection. No app is required to read the books.

By April, the library should also provide access to downloadable music and movies through a service called *Hoopla*. *Hoopla* contains first run movies, music, and audiobooks. Using the *Hoopla* app you can download or stream the latest music releases from today's top artists such as Katy Perry or Sam Smith. You can watch *The King's Speech* or *Lego; The Adventures of the Clutch Powers* or listen to audio books with no holds. This is a great alternative to *Hulu* and *Spotify*.






On Friday, **May 29**, the last day of school, students can blow off some steam and compete in an outdoor catapult contest.
