Just finished the *last* page of your *last* novel from our Fall Book Sale? Get ready to refill your shelves! Thousands (and thousands) of titles are currently being sorted, packed, and stacked for our upcoming used book sale. Once again, we'll offer a wide variety of fiction and non-fiction categories - including children's and vintage books.

As usual, the sale will be located in the Thomas M. McKee Hall at The Ranch (Larimer County Fairgrounds). Members of the Friends of the Loveland Library are invited to attend the pre-sale on Friday, **April 22**, from 4 - 7 p.m. (If you're not yet a member, you may purchase a membership at the door to take advantage of that preview date.) As a courtesy to our shoppers, we ask that booksellers not use scanners during these special Friday hours.

Our sale is open to the public on Saturday, **April 23** (10 a.m. - 4 p.m.) and again on Sunday, **April 24** (11 a.m. - 3 p.m.). Sunday is designated as "bag day" - fill a standard-size plastic grocery bag with books (except vintage) for only \$5. Larger bags priced accordingly.

Children through 12 years of age who attend the sale may select one free book of their choice from the Children's Area. Otherwise, children's books are priced at \$1. (Continued on p. 2)

Meet Our New President

Hi, I'm Kathy Keeler. I was elected President of the Board by the Friends Board of Directors at the February meeting. I started with the Friends in 2009. First I helped at a used book sale... Then I started sorting at The Sorting Place on Wednesdays and then helping on Tuesdays during the presort.

After my second used book sale I said, "The romances are not organized. How can anyone find anything?" And so, I became in charge of romances at the sale, alphabetizing them. That is an important feature of volunteer organizations and one that never fails to amuse me: if you have a good idea, well, we're all volunteers here; make it happen!

I was elected to the Board in 2011 to fill out a 2-year term and then reelected for a full 3-year term. On the Board I got involved in all sorts of Friends' activities beyond the used book sales. I was Board Secretary last year.

The Friends is a big volunteer organization, with continuous and complicated activities. My plan as President is simply to help with everything the Friends do. The one thing I will try to change; that is, to improve is communication. Volunteering is fun. Pitching in on Friends' activities is fun! But you can't be there if you didn't know it was happening. I will try to reach you all with all the methods available to me so you know what is coming.



And please, this is an organization comprised of the members. If you have an idea for improving communication, let me know and we'll see what we can do. Just because I'll first ask "do you want to make that happen?" doesn't mean you have to say yes. Of course that applies beyond communication; if you have a good idea for the Friends, share it!

Outside of the Friends, I have a small business, A Wandering Botanist, talking and writing about plants, travel and history (http://awanderingbotanist.com). It's a one-person operation and keeps me very busy. Before coming to Loveland, I was a professor of biology (plant ecology) at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln for 31 years. My Ph.D. is from the Genetics Department at the University of California Berkeley. I met Karl Anderson while I was in graduate school. We have been married 40 years. What we particularly like to do together is to travel.

2015 in Review at the Annual Meeting

The room was packed for the 2016 Annual Membership and Volunteer Appreciation Meeting on January 29. Participants enjoyed a delicious Italian dinner and were treated to a short preview of the Mystery Night at the Library. The Library staff gave a nice overview of all the activities of the library – which we all know is a place "Where You Can". The Friends' board provided a complete written summary, its committee activities and financial reports which you can find on the Friends' website. It was a busy year for the FOL! Throughout the year, the Art Selection Committee participates with library staff and board members in choosing art for the library. The art changes quarterly and features Colorado artists.

The new Book Cart at the Library was a huge success. It contains samplings of donated books for sale and is located in the Library foyer. Buyers participated using the honor system that resuled in a profit of \$2500 for 2015.

The community participated enthusiastically in Loveland Lights last December, enjoying the lights, music, Christmas trees and gingerbread house competition. Loveland Loves to Read celebrated another successful event with author Kent Krueger, adding profit to the balance sheet. Membership continues to grow with 200 new members and over 300 renewals in 2015. The Sorting Place remained a busy spot in town last year, processing a record 105,000 books received and boxed for delivery to the semi-annual book sales. More records were set at the book sales in 2015 and shoppers enjoyed a number of new and fun incentives.

As always, none of the Friends' activities would be possible without the dedicated volunteers who provided nearly 10,000 hours of enthusiastic and loyal work.

As a result of all this effort, the Friends enjoyed an excellent 2015 financially. Income exceeded the budget by \$17,000 while expenditures were about \$21,000 below budget. The extra income came primarily from the used book sales. Savings were realized across the board but particularly in Loveland Loves to Read event. This resulted in our ability to propose a 2016 budget with a \$16,000 deficit without tapping any of the pre-2015 reserve balance. Our non-designated reserve is about \$194,000. The board feels this is an appropriate cushion due to uncertainties regarding future fundraising initiatives.

Annis served on the Board of Directors and assumed the office of Treasurer before the Friends even had an official bank account. In recent years, she has maintained an active role at the Sorting Place every week and at our semi-annual Used Book Sales. Her cheerful smile and tireless energy

are the hallmark of Annis's commitment to volunteerism.




