#### **Loveland Loves to Read, 2017**

The Loveland Loves to Read committee has exciting plans in place for all who have followed Navajo Lt. Joe Leaphorn and Officer Chee through eighteen Navajo mysteries written by Tony Hillerman. The author died in 2007. Since then, his daughter Anne has carried on the Leaphorn and Chee detective mysteries with three more novels, also set in the Four Corners area. Her first of the series, *Spider Woman's Daughter*, is our book selection for this year.

On **September 18**, at the Rialto Theater, Anne will talk about her work with her father before his death and the choices they made together for continuation of his work. To reserve two tickets in the front rows of the theater for this event, you can make a donation to Loveland Friends of the Library. Be sure mark your donation: <u>FOR</u> Loveland Loves to Read.

2016 has been a year of change for the Membership Committee. We moved the membership data from a manually created spreadsheet to an automated software program. There are many benefits from this conversion and a few challenges.

#### Benefits include:

- Easier updating of member information via the Internet
- Readily available information for board members
- Greater security of membership information
- Easily generated reports that aide in event planning, membership mailings, volunteer identification and communication via email to members and volunteers
- Decreased postage costs due to the easy email availability
- Members' ability to update their information online
- Join or renew online.

#### Some of our challenges include:

- A big learning curve for those implementing the program
- Changes in some of our processes
- Maintaining BOTH a manual system for those who do not have email and the new automated system for everyone else.

#### What each member can do:

- If you have an email address, please consider sharing it with the Friends. We do not share email addresses with anyone outside of the Friends without your permission.
- If you share your email address, please open your email. Membership renewal notices are sent automatically via email. Emails are also used for other Friend's business and communication. Our data indicates that just over 50% of the emails sent are opened.
- Sign into the website http://friendsofthe lovelandlibrary.org and update your member information.

#### Goals for 2017:

- 1. Continue to define membership processes for new and renewing members to make them as easy as possible.
- 2. Increase utilization of the reporting function to provide reports to Friends' leadership.
- 3. Increase the use of email communication with all members.



On **April 4 & 5**, we visit The Great War with Erich Maria Remarque's *All Quiet on the Western Front*. Banned in Hitler's Germany, this has been called the greatest anti-war novel of all time. Remarque's masterpiece deserves to be revisited now, 100 years after his war experience.

On **May 2 & 3**, we return to our perennial favorite mystery writer, Louise Penny. *The Nature of the Beast* chronicles the further adventures of Armand Gamache, retired head of homicide for the Sûreté du Québec. When a small boy who is fond of "crying wolf" disappears, Gamache realizes that he should have listened to the boy's talk of a monster in the woods.

**May 9**, 6 - 8 p.m. *Sergeant York* (1941 Academy Award) The true story of Alvin York. Torn between religious pacifism and patriotism, York went on to become the most acclaimed hero of World War I. Erion Room

**May 2**, 6 - 8 p.m. *Lafayette Escadrille* – the name given to the American volunteer pilots who flew with the French Air Service in World War I. Gertrude Scott Room

**May 9**, 6 - 8 p.m. *Sergeant York* (1941 Academy Award) The true story of Alvin York. Torn between religious pacifism and patriotism, York went on to become the most acclaimed hero of World War I. Erion Room



#### **Message From Marcia**

Since I am retiring from the library April 14, I find myself looking back at my 34+-year career at the Loveland Library. I am amazed by the changes but proud that our mission relating to customer service and lifelong learning has not waivered.

When I arrived in August 1982, the library was closed on Sundays and Mondays. The library was on 6th and Cleveland, which is now the County Building. The building did not have an elevator and I remember parents struggling to get strollers up the stairs to the children's area.

Fortunately, after several years of financial and political struggle, the library moved to its current Civic Center site late in 1987 where all services were on ground level. We had space for programs and the growing collection. And the collection did grow, especially the media area! We have moved from circulating records and cassettes to CDs and DVDs and now to downloadables and eReaders.

Over the years many technological advances have occurred at the library. In 1985, we started to issue library cards with barcodes and began checking out using computers. August 8, 1988 stands out as the date staff stopped filing cards in the card catalog. Our latest change to the catalog occurred just last month when we merged and migrated from an independent Loveland-only catalog to the Flatirons Library Consortium where we share a catalog with the city libraries in Boulder, Broomfield, Lafayette, Louisville and Longmont.

There were several years of ups-and-downs with a Friends group too. In the early '80s the Friends hosted a monthly noontime book or travel program selling a sack lunch for \$1. That group did dissolve but the Friends of the Library reorganized once we moved to the civic center. This is the group that still exists and has become an official 501c3 nonprofit foundation. From those early efforts the Friends has grown to over 800 individual members and is the major fundraising organization supporting the library in numerous ways.

The library staff and patrons definitely benefit from the support provided by the Friends. And we might not even be in the expanded and renovated building finished in 2012 without the two million dollars donated through fundraisers by the Friends of the Library Foundation.

It has been exciting to see how the Friends and the library have grown. One of the joys of my career has been working with the dedicated Friends volunteers. Thank you!
