


Memoir-Writing Workshop with Veronica Patterson: In conjunction

Please be aware that some changes have been made for the October Book Sale schedule. The Friday, October 24 sale for MEMBERS ONLY will run from 4-7 p.m. Closing time is one hour earlier than in prior years. No dealers will be present at the Friday evening sale. A time for BOOK-DEALERS-ONLY will be on Saturday, October 25 from 8-10 a.m. The sale will be open to the public on Saturday, October 25 from 10 a.m.- 4 p.m. and on Sunday, October 26 from 11 a.m.-3 p.m.

On Sunday, **October 26**, we feature the ever-popular "Bag Day" format. Books can be purchased by the bag-full and the price per bag will depend on the size of the bag, beginning at \$5 per standard plastic grocery bag. Larger, reusable bags will be priced according to the size of the bags.

The Library History Project


George Franke is compiling a history of the Loveland Public Library and the Friends of the Library. The project started several years ago. As with other archeological activity, the more one digs, the more one finds. George has unearthed a number of sources and welcomes any written material and photographs related to the library from its origin in the late 1880's

Bookmarks Update

There are bookmarks and then there are bookmarks. In the process of sorting books for our used book sale, we collect anything that passes for a bookmark. George Franke sorts them, and we offer the authentic bookmarks for sale. The oldest bookmark retrieved so far is an Easter greeting in the shape of a cross. On the back is an inscription: "Easter Greetings to Lura from Mama, 1912." It was designed at the studios in England and printed at the Fine Art Works in Bavaria

In addition, the following items have been used as bookmarks: business cards, coupons, collector cards, greeting cards, _____

cards, greeting cards, postcards, event ticket stubs, family photographs, newspaper clippings, rulers, birth and death notices, pressed leaves and



movie gift cards, rewards cards, etc), and of course, airline boarding passes. The oldest items so far are two checks from the Stock Growers National Bank of Cheyenne written in 1882 for \$24.26. (Editor's note: some items—like pieces of toilet tissue—don't make it to George.)

If you collect old photos, postcards, business cards, beer coasters, tickets, or any flat item that might work as a bookmark – give George a call (970-203-0904) to arrange a time for sharing.

Prospector Update

The library recently expanded its collection by joining Prospector, a consortium of 43 academic, public, and special libraries in Colorado and Wyoming with holdings of more than 12 million titles. If you have an internet connection, you can now request items yourself from any of these libraries. Simply start your search in our library catalog, www.lovelandpubliclibrary.org. If we don't have the item that you're looking for, click on the Prospector icon next to your search and Prospector will automatically search other member libraries for your request. All you need to provide is your name and library card number. Your items will be sent to Loveland for you to pick up and check out. Loveland joined Prospector in mid-May and since then we have averaged 56 loans to other libraries and have borrowed 26 items for Loveland patrons each day. Soon the Colorado Alliance will be partnering with MOBIUS, a similar consortium in Missouri to expand access to even more resources.


