

### Loveland Lights Ushers In the Holiday Season

Saturday, **December 5** (9 a.m. – 6 p.m.) and Sunday, **December 6** (1-5 p.m.) Loveland Lights, sponsored by Friends of Loveland Public Library, the library will be transformed into a winter holiday wonderland featuring snowmen, decorated trees, gingerbread houses and activities and entertainment for kids of all ages. The always-popular graham cracker gingerbread house workshops will be held in the children's storytime room. The Friends will host a holiday book and bake sale and are encouraging participants to bring non-perishable food items to donate.

The 6th Annual Gingerbread Challenge is part of Loveland Lights and will take place on both Saturday and Sunday. The gingerbread creations will be on display in the Galleria that weekend. Gingerbread creations can be entered in one of five categories - Adult Amateur, Adult Professional (bakers, chefs, artists, etc.), Teens (11-17), Youth (10 and younger) and Team (any group of three or more). There is no entry fee. Entry forms and instruction packets are located on the Gingerbread Challenge book display at Loveland Public Library. ## Fall Book Sale Sets New Record

Thanks to all the volunteers who helped make the Fall Book Sale our largest ever. We didn't know if we could even store all the 1.925 boxes of books we took to the sale. As the stacks grew taller and the storage room began to resemble Wall Street, we held our breath and hoped they wouldn't tumble. In the end. all was well and we had 5 truckloads delivered by early Wednesday afternoon. We had a great crew helping to load and unload, including several young people from the Church of the Latter Day Saints. Even the rain didn't slow them down.

In the 6 months leading up to the sale, the Sorting Place volunteers sorted nearly 60,000 books into 58 non-fiction categories and 26 fiction categories, one for each letter of the alphabet. Each book had to be checked for bookmarks. author's signature and excess underlining, water damage or mold. In addition to basic sorting and packing, volunteers taped boxes, presorted books, took recycling containers out, accepted donations, vacuumed the floor and even cleaned the bathroom. The list is really endless. In the flurry of it all, they still managed to have fun!

Every one of our volunteers is vital to the book sale success. Singling out just a few for special thanks, Carol Morganti, Annis Askew and Susan Gagnon are always there and always willing to answer questions and help out;

Gene Fender always seems to be doing the next task; Kathy Keeler is our idea person and "enforcer"; and Jody Love manages the huge hardback fiction section. Overall, our volunteers offered over 2,200 hours of labor just to get the books to the sale. A huge thank you to everyone who made this sale such a success!

way.


He described his Edgar Award winning mystery as a blending of his upbringing, his spiritual journey, and his calling to write. Kent is also the author of the Cork O'Connor series, causing him to be nicknamed the Tony Hillerman of Minnesota.

Lunch with Kent on the following day again proved to be a warm, friendly and happy experience as he walked from table to table meeting "the lovely people of Loveland." He referenced many quotes from other authors and notables regarding the importance of literary experiences. Kent believes that libraries are nothing less than the archives of our culture. Free and open access to knowledge is an essential right in a democracy. Kent views libraries as vital to our freedom as the rights found in the Constitution.

### Loveland Historical Newspapers Now Available Online

Thanks to funding from the Friends of the Library and a grant from the Colorado Historical Records Advisory Board, the Loveland Public Library now has three digitized newspapers from the past available to the public. These included Loveland Leader, 1892-1893, The Loveland Daily Herald, 1914-18, and Loveland Reporter, 1915 and 1917. These are housed in the award winning Colorado Historical Newspapers Collection website: http:// www.coloradohistoricnewspapers. org. This site allows worldwide access to the materials. The addition of the newspapers comes at an opportune time for people researching World War I.


### **Computer Classes**






