## **Snowflakes Adorn the Library - 2013 Loveland Lights Celebration**

The weekend of December 7- 8, the library was transformed into a Winter Wonderland, with snowflakes hanging everywhere. The eighth annual Loveland Lights Celebration once again was a crowd pleaser for children of all ages.

Over the weekend, nearly 3,000 people walked through the doors of the library. The ever-popular Kids Gingerbread Workshops welcomed over 200 children during the numerous sessions.

Purple glitter snowflakes were hidden all over the library for children to find and count in the "Find the Snowflake Contest". New this year were activities for the Teens that included Shadow Boxes led by Rose Watson, a Larimer County Environmental Educator, and a Gingerbread Workshop where 40 teens made amazing Gingerbread creations. The Holiday Book and Bake Sales once again proved a favorite. \$950 in profits will support the Friends' projects for the library.

Loveland Lights is for kids of ALL ages. Musical entertainment was offered throughout the weekend, as well as holiday food demonstrations and samples, and gift giving ideas. Informative presentations on Snowflakes and Laura Ingalls Wilder's Christmases were well attended. The Gingerbread Challenge had eighteen spectacular entries, each a unique work of art. ## A Record-Breaking Fall Book Sale

Congratulations and thank you to the outstanding volunteers who put the Fall Used Book Sale together. A record **1,809** boxes were pre-sorted and taken to this sale.

Our gross sales were \$33,275.64, with expenses of \$3,098.60, making **\$30,177.04** available for library programs and equipment and our operating expenses.

201 volunteers worked this sale; logging **3,951** hours since our Spring Sale last April. Of those, 54 sort on a regular basis, logging 2,399 hours. 183 volunteers logged 1,552 hours during the week of set up and sale.

We are especially grateful to Jami McMannes, Jamie Suess and the staff at United Way of Larimer County for coordinating the "Make A Difference Day" Project. Their dedication to helping organizations "Live United" provided us with 46 volunteers logging 190 hours.

The following individual students kept tables restocked and organized, helped customers locate books and carried out purchases: Sean F., Abigail S., Allison J., and Emily L.

Gratitude is extended to our individual book donors and business friends: Stephanie and Mark Stauder and staff of Anthology Book Company; Barbara Haynes, Ruth and Sam Chesher and staff of Book Haven Book Store: Theresa Bayless and staff of Booklover's Bookstore LLC; Vivian Tapp and staff from Barnes and Noble. ## President's Report-Friends of the Loveland Public Library Foundation, Inc.

2013 was a busy and very successful year for the Friends of the Loveland Library. Our Fall Used Book Sale broke previous records for participants and profits. SweetNight "Brought It Back Home in Style", moving the venue of our annual Valentine's Dance and silent auction to the library. Loveland Loves to Read hosted Tom Franklin at our One Book-One Community author event in September to an enthusiastic audience. Loveland Lights delighted young and old with a snowflakes-themed holiday celebration in December.

In addition to the above activities, this year your Board of Directors accomplished the following:

- Established goals for the Friends.
- Added an evening with Kevin Cook session every month to accommodate his increasingly popular noontime programs at the library.
- Funded the iLearn Computer Classes and approved an additional 5 classes per month.
- Provided the Loveland Library with \$45,000 for its activities and programs not covered by budget, including the summer reading programs, e-Readers, teenscene and children's guest speakers/entertainers, and books for Priscilla's Bookshelf (book club bags).
- Helped purchase a 3-D printer for the library.
- Established an Art Selection Committee to provide various works of art in the Galleria display cases at the library, changed quarterly.
- Began a Facebook page.
- Provided a brunch in August at the Chilson Center to express our appreciation for our wonderful volunteers.
- Joined the Northern Colorado Nonprofit Resource Center and attended many workshops to improve our knowledge and networking as a nonprofit organization.
- Purchased electronic cash registers to improve checking out at our biannual used book sales.

Thanks to all of our members, donors and volunteers whose support and enthusiasm helped us achieve these successes!

The book discussion groups and the Great Ideas Discussions as well as the tatting, loom knitting and origami craft sessions continue. Noontime Nature and Nighttime Nature with Kevin Cook continue to fill the Gertrude Scott Meeting Room to capacity. March once again brings weekly gardening classes presented by CSU Master Gardeners. New is a monthly Alfred Hitchcock Film Night and several finance and health related programs.

Also watch for a special evening of Celtic music at 6:30 p.m. on **March 18** featuring Jerry Barlow. Barlow is a Celtic finger-style guitarist and storyteller whose repertoire incorporates favorite traditional pieces as well as his own Celtic-inspired compositions.



**Tech Talk** 

Anyone who recently acquired an electronic device and needs a little instruction in using it is invited to attend the next Tech Zoo on Saturday, **February 15**10 a.m.-2p.m. Library tech experts will provide free advice on use and operation of tablets, eReaders, cellphones and other devices on a first come, first serve basis.

The classes in understanding eReaders and downloading library eBooks have been restructured. Anyone owning a color eReader can attend sessions on Tuesday, February 11 at 4:30 p.m. or Saturday, March 8 at 10 a.m. Sessions on using black & white eReaders will be held Thursday, February 20 at 5:30 p.m. and Saturday, March 8 at 12:30 p.m.

The February schedule of free computer classes is listed on the enclosed calendar. Space is limited and early registration is recommended. A similar schedule of classes will be offered in March. Instructors from the Education and Life Training Center with funding from the Friends of the Library Foundation teach most classes.

After 20 years of Noontime Nature programs on the first Tuesday of each month, Kevin has become just too popular! Last year a Nighttime Nature repeat program was added on the first Wednesday of the month. In January both programs were filled to capacity. The library is investigating other options to meet the demand. In the meantime, anyone wanting to attend should arrive very early or be prepared to be turned away when the Fire Marshall's limit is reached. This vear's topic will be *Echoes to* Bugles: Stories of Colorado Mammals. While we hope to accommodate all interested attendees in Loveland, Cook does present the same programs in Greeley and Fort Collins libraries.

In conjunction with the Larimer County Genealogical Society, the library will offer two half-day classes. Pat Johnson will teach an "Introduction to Genealogy" class on Saturday, February 22 from 9:15 a.m.-12:15 p.m. On **March** 22, "Land of Plenty-American Land Records and Their History" will be presented from 9:15 a.m.-12:15 p.m. Participants wanting to attend these free classes should register at www.lcgsco.org. ## **Book Discussion Groups**

The Library Adult Book
Discussion Groups have been
meeting for 15 years with Janice
Benedict as the leader. Once a
staff member, Janice now
continues as a volunteer. The
groups meet the first Tuesday of
each month at 9:00 a.m. and 6:30
p.m. (note the new time!) and the
following Wednesday morning at
9 a.m. in the Erion Room. The
selections for February and March
are as follows:

February 4 & 5 – The Round House, by Louise Erdrich, winner of the National Book Award. Set on the Ojibwe reservation in North Dakota, this is the story of a boy who seeks justice for a crime and understanding of the changes that crime has wrought. Part mystery, part coming of age story, completely compelling.

March 4 & 5 – The Tenderness of Wolves, a mystery by Stef Penney. The isolation of the 19<sup>th</sup> century Canadian wilderness is the backdrop for murder, but it is the search for the suspects and the web of human desires and relationships that holds the reader.

Three new book bags were added to Priscilla's Shelf during December: *The History of Love* by Nicole Krauss, *The Places in Between*, by Rory Stewart, and *So Much For That* by Lionel Shriver.

### **Tatting Class Growing**

Tatting or handcrafted lace is an old craft that is gaining modern supporters. The class is held the fourth Saturday of each month, 10 am-noon, but now a practice group meets every Wednesday from 10 a.m.-noon. Participants are learning to make lace edging as well as doilies, collars and necklaces.

### Vicky's Knitting Loom Group

On the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month at 1 p.m., a busy group of crafters make hats using knitting looms. In the coming months other loom knitting techniques will also be presented. 

### Focus on Preschool Literacy

The Colorado State Legislature recognized the importance of early literacy and reinstated State Aid to Libraries with funding designated for books and materials targeted to pre-readers and beginning readers. More books will soon be arriving. Parents can learn how to help their

children become lovers of reading by bringing them to the storytimes presented at the library. Schedules, ages and themes are listed on the enclosed calendar.



Read Aloud Loveland and the library invite four-year olds to the Fantastic Fours Reading Festival at 2 p.m. on Saturday, **March 8**. Read Aloud volunteers will read stories and there will be crafts and refreshments with a *Very Hungry Caterpillar* theme. Each four-year old child with an adult will receive a free book. Registration is not required but attendance is limited to 100 children.

Read Aloud Loveland is a volunteer non-profit organization that shares the love of reading with preschoolers in a variety of ways.

#### Programs for Elementary Ages

Library activities for school-aged children are designed to show that library activities are fun and educational. School Out Science at 3 p.m. on **February 17** will focus on bees and beekeeping for ages 5-10 while School Out Science at 3 p.m. on **March 31** will be for ages 8 and up. Representatives from the Northern Colorado Beekeepers Association will be the presenters.

Craft programs include making pencil pals for yourself or Valentine's Day gifts on Saturday, **February 8** at 2 p.m. and Mosaic Art on Saturday, **March 8** at 10 a.m. The Brickmasters Lego Club is a monthly favorite. Drop-in Chess for children ages 5-10 is every Tuesday from 4-5:30 p.m. During Waggin' Tales, beginning readers can practice reading to registered therapy dogs. Fifteen-minute time slots are available on a first come, first served basis.

#### Message from Marcia

"2013: The Only Constant is Change" is the slogan I use to describe the last year at the library. We had exciting, positive staff turnover but also sadness at the death of Administrative Assistant Patty Goodwine in the flood. We honored Customer Service Manager Lupe Saldana as she retired after 46 years at the library. Longtime librarians Joan Stephenson and Diane Hansen also retired in 2013.

2013 was our first full year in the renovated space and while we have adjusted, there were changes and improvements made throughout the year. I am most proud of the dramatic increase in volunteer hours donated to the library. These hours are equivalent to three full-time employees! We couldn't do it all without these fantastic volunteers.

Circulation of library materials was stable, down less than one half of one percent. The number of programs and attendance has not been calculated yet but certainly has seen an increase. Additional computer classes were added and were usually full. Over 41,000 children attended storytimes and other programs.

The library staff has increased outreach and promotion outside the library with visits to high school Back to School Nights, increased cooperation with the Loveland Center for Business Development, special outreach to children at Lago Vista Mobile Home Park in conjunction with R2J teachers, collaboration with the Loveland Museum and Gallery to provide programs related to the Muslim Journeys Bookshelf as well as participation in Homeless Connect, the NoCo Mini-Maker Faire, McKee's Health Fair, Halloween Festival, Battle of the Books, Children's Day and Public Works Day.

More citizens are learning about the technology resources in the library and are using the iCreate content creation lab with its digital editing equipment and very large printer. The LoveLibrary app makes access to the library catalog and eBooks easier. With support from the Friends of the Library and the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado, the library now has a Lulzbot 3D printer.

More exciting changes are planned for 2014. The contract has been signed and the library will soon be joining Prospector, the Colorado online catalog and interlibrary cooperative system that includes 42 other libraries and

access to millions of titles. The staff and board will continue to work on the strategic plan that kicked off with a daylong planning retreat last August. With the generous support of the Friends of the Library and the community, the library will continue to offer excellent customer service.

#### **Book Donation Reminders**


