
If severe weather closes the library on March 12, Mystery in the Library will be held the following Saturday, **March 19**. The criminal must be brought to justice!

2015 Financial Report

The Friends had an excellent year financially in 2015. Income exceeded the budget by \$17,000 while actual expenditures were about \$21,000 below the projected budget. The extra income came primarily from the Friends' semi-annual used book sales. Savings were across the board but particularly from the Loveland Loves to Read event. Income and savings from 2015 resulted in our ability to propose a 2016 budget with a \$16,000 deficit without tapping the pre-2015 reserve balance. Our non-designated reserve is about \$194,000. The board feels this is an appropriate cushion due to uncertainties regarding future fundraising initiatives. Master Gardening


