2016 in Review at the Annual Meeting

A “Tree Grew in Loveland” at the Friends Annual Membership Meeting on January 20. Volunteers from each of the Friends’ events and projects gave an overview of their area and added a piece to a tree that grew before our eyes. Fundraising efforts created the trunk of the tree, programs supported by the Friends provided the leaves and volunteers were depicted in the raindrops that feed the tree and help it grow.

The trunk began with the Book Sales by far the largest fund raising events each year. 2016 was no exception. Almost 90,000 books were displayed at the sales and hungrily picked over by happy patrons. All of those books were sorted and packed at the Sorting Place, the next part of the trunk added to the tree.

The trunk continued to grow with Membership, Book Cart, Colorado Gives, Loveland Lights, the Murder Mystery, Loveland Loves to Read, Pints for People and the upcoming Brick Project. 814 individuals are now part of Friends, including 34 at the new Patron Level memberships. The Book Cart at the library where hundreds of books that would otherwise have no home are sold continues to be a great success. Friends were new to Colorado Gives in 2016, an annual statewide movement to celebrate and increase philanthropy through online giving.

The Loveland Lights tradition continued in an expanded fashion with representatives from the Jewish community, League of United Latin American Citizens, and a Kwanzaa storyteller. The Mystery Night at the Library was a new and fun event with a full house, where wannabe sleuths enjoyed an entertaining drama and solved the murder of a successful mystery writer. Loveland Loves to Read showcased Kent Myers' *The Work of Wolves* and book discussions, a night with the author, a writing workshop, and lunch with the author were filled to capacity. Friends took advantage of Loveland Ale Works community-minded spirit and gathered for a Pints for People evening at the brewery. The Brick Project has been dormant for a few years but is likely to return soon.

The tree bloomed when the Art Selection Committee, *The Need to Know* editor and the library added leaves to depict projects supported by our fundraisers. Art is selected each year for quarterly displays in the main hallway of the library. *The Need to Know* where you can learn about all Friends' activities is mailed to about 300 and emailed to almost 400 readers every other month. The tree really exploded with leaves when the Library staff summarized just a few of the many programs that Friends funds. Computer classes, reader activities for children, teens, and adults, speakers, software, equipment and more are made possible at our terrific library because of Friends fundraising.

The tree looked great with its multi-part trunk and many leaves. But everyone knows a tree needs rain to grow so raindrops depicting Friends' energetic volunteers were added by members sitting all over the room.

As a result of all this effort, the Friends enjoyed another strong year financially. Income exceeded the budget by \$37,000, primarily due to higher than anticipated donations. And our thrift-minded committees caused expenses to be \$16,000 less than budgeted. Our non-designated reserve is \$219,255.

Members were treated to a tasty barbeque dinner followed by the annual business meeting. We approved a balanced budget for 2017 and elected our three new board members. We also gave tribute to George and Barbara Franke, our Annis Askew Volunteers of the Year honored at the Volunteer Appreciation event held earlier in 2016.

The Friends' board provided written committee and financial reports which you can find on the Friends' website. It's awesome to be a part of the Friends of the Loveland Public Library!

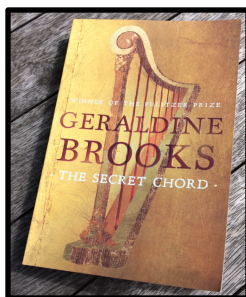

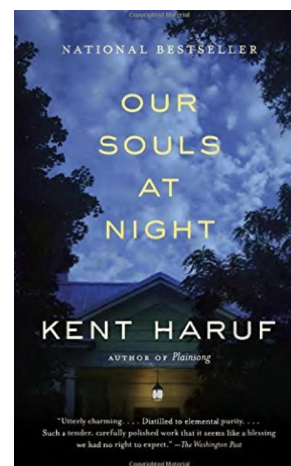
Adult Book Discussions

It's the Old Testament come to life!

Wandering Botanist

On **February 14** at 12 noon the Wandering Botanist Kathy Keeler will take us to Singapore which is a city-state, a tiny independent country on a small island. Its diverse population consisting of English, Chinese, Malay, Indonesians and people from the rest of Asia reflects its history and geography. In the last decade, Singapore has had one of the strongest economies in the world. The presentation looks at the history of this fascinating place, with special reference to it as a comfortable place to see tropical Asian plants.

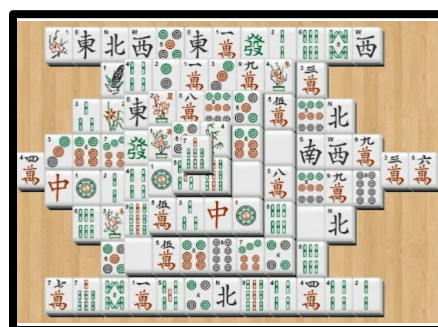

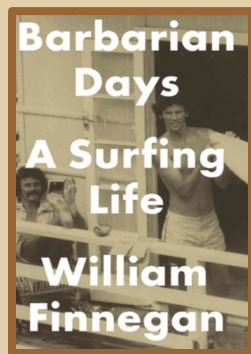


Buzzwords Non-Fiction Book Club

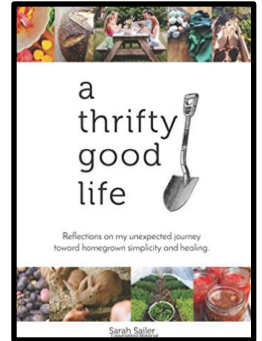

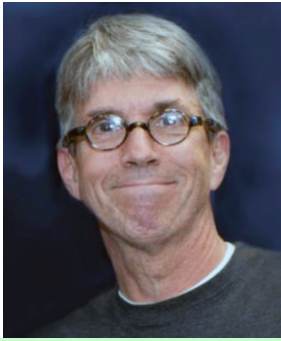
