



Record Fall Book Sale



Now that all the monies are counted and bills are in, we are excited to tell you our gross sales were \$31,326.21. After expenses of \$1,713.26, we have \$29,612.95 available for future use toward library programs, equipment, and our operating expenses, making the fall book sale our most successful ever!

226 volunteers worked the sale, logging over 4,039 hours since our Spring Used Book Sale in April. 212 volunteers logged over 1,543 hours during the week of set up and sale.

A New Year of Noontime Nature

Naturalist Kevin Cook starts a new series of programs for 2012 with the overall theme "At Home with the Trees." This year-long series, presented the first Tuesday of each month, examines how trees support wildlife by considering a single idealized tree as if it were a hotel where animals. fungi, and even other plants can check in to live their lives. In this metaphor, as in real life, some wildlife comes and goes, occasionally or regularly, and some wildlife comes and stays; but the one thing they all share in common is that the tree is vital to their own individual lives and well-being. Through the tree they interconnect as community.



On January 3 the topic is "Hotel Ponderosa" which will investigate life in a ponderosa pine. Having survived storms of wind and snow and fire, the great tree yet stands where glaciers long ago scoured the land and left grit where once there had been solid stone. Now guests and residents alike can look out from great balcony limbs and see grassy meadows strewn with wildflowers. Among those residents are a bird and a squirrel whose lives intimately connect to the magnificent Hotel Ponderosa.

ic is Aspen Retreat. The last of Colorado's glaciers was old and melting into the lore of ages when the tiny seed opened. A root, fragile yet remarkably durable, grew into the soil, beginning life for a single tree that became a forest. A sapling when the last mammoths walked, it grows there still. Changed from ancient times, nevertheless home for birds, insects, and fungi, it remains the magnificent Aspen Retreat.


Seven storytimes with Miss Kris are held each week for toddlers and preschoolers. Check the enclosed calendar for ages, times and themes.
