Thank You For Another Successful Used Book Sale

We want to express our congratulations and a sincere thank you to the outstanding group of volunteers who made the Fall Used Book Sale possible. 1,645 boxes of books were pre-sorted and taken to the sale.

Our gross sales were \$28,846.00. After expenses, \$26,341.66 is available for use toward library programs, equipment, and the Friends' operating expenses.

156 volunteers worked on the Fall Book Sale, logging over 3,182 hours; 109 volunteers logged over 1255 hours during the week of set up and sale

They helped to set up tables, unload trucks, lay out categories and break down boxes. 



Loveland Lights A Huge Success




