It's that time again! Your Loveland Loves to Read Committee has chosen *The Work of Wolves* by Kent Meyers for the featured title and author of 2016. Books are flying off the shelves at the library! This mystery, set in the Black Hills area of South Dakota, has won the Mountain and Plains Booksellers Association Award and an American Library Association Award.

The committee has finalized plans for An Evening with the Author at the Rialto on **October 10**, 7:00 p.m. Tickets are \$5 and will be available at the Rialto box office or online: [rialtolovelandticketforce.com](http://rialtolovelandticketforce.com)

Additionally, we are proud to announce that Kent Meyers will provide a 3 hour writing workshop in the Gertrude Scott room at the library on the morning of **October 11** from 9 - 12 noon. Meyers teaches writing at Black Hills State University and at the Pacific Lutheran University's summer Rainier Writing Workshops. Registration for the workshop is \$25.

A luncheon with the author will follow the workshop, held at Biaggi's at 1 p.m. on **October 11**. Reservations are \$32. Check our website and future newsletters for further information.

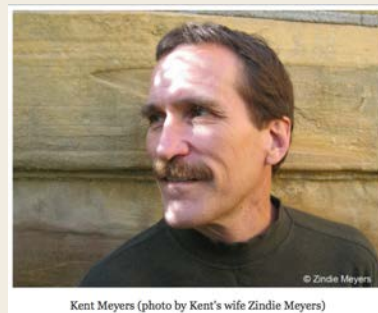
What has made Loveland Loves to Read such an integral part of our community? It's readers like you who have enjoyed the visits of award-winners authors like Margaret Coel, James Galvin, Alexander McCall Smith, Alexandra Fuller and William Kent Krueger. Every year, we are challenged to keep up our literary standards and meet your expectations!

Loveland Loves to Read began in 2004 with a mission to share western-themed books and present their authors to the community. Over the past twelve years, we have broadened our scope and increased community participation. We try our best to construct a break-even budget while keeping the cost of participation as low as possible. We have kept the cost of the author talk at \$5 per ticket. Other program events, such as a writer's workshop and lunch with the author are offered at cost.

LLR events are sponsored by the Friends of the Loveland Public Library Foundation (FOLPLF), but we need your help. A donation of \$25 - \$99 from individuals, businesses or book groups entitles donors to two free tickets for the author talk at the Rialto.

A donation of \$100 or more entitles donors to two reserved seats up-front for the author talk and a free autographed book (other than *Work of Wolves*) by our featured author. Donations are tax deductible.

\*According to Wonderopolis.org, Yarn storming is a new form of graffiti or street art that also goes by several other names: yarn bombing, guerrilla knitting, urban knitting and graffiti knitting. Instead of paint or chalk, yarn stormers use colorful knitted or crocheted yarn or fiber. Unlike painted graffiti, yarn storms aren't permanent and can be easily removed.
