The Friends are happy to welcome our new Library Director, Diane Lapierre. Diane is a Loveland native who has spent more than two decades moving to the top level of Denver Public Library's administrative ranks. She says her memories of growing up in Loveland include "checking out as many books as I could carry down the stairs" of the old Sixth Street library. Diane will assume her new duties **June 5**.

Diane is currently the Denver Public Library's Director of Community Relations, coordinating outreach, marketing, fundraising and public relations

activities for all the library system's 26 locations. Her 22-year career at the Denver Public Library includes a term as the library's Director of Strategic Initiatives, managing a "cluster" of three large branches of the Denver system and serving as Senior Branch Librarian.

"We think Diane has all the attributes we seek to raise our outstanding library to an even higher level," Assistant City Manager Rod Wensing said. "We're also proud to be able to bring a Loveland native home to serve in this important leadership position."






ReadMore Book Discussions




Survivor Programs

Reflections on Surviving the Holocaust with Jack Adler - The library invites you to listen to Jack Adler as he shares his story of struggle and survival during the Holocaust. Adler uses his story to talk about the causes of anti-Semitism and the historic and future impact of hate on common people. Despite his struggles, Adler is a firm believer in the golden rule and that respect is the key to peace. Jack Adler was born in Pabianice, Poland in 1929. In 1939, the Nazis invaded Poland and established Jewish ghettos where Jack and his family were forced to live for years before being liquidated. Those who survived were sent to concentration camps. In 1945, Jack was liberated by American soldiers while on the Dachau Death March. All of his family perished at the hands of the Nazis. An orphan of the Holocaust, Jack left Poland in 1946 to settle in Skokie, Illinois. This program is sponsored by the Friends of the Loveland Public Library. Gertrude Scott Room. Surviving Skokie: Not Here, Not Now, Not Ever Again - After listening to Jack Adler talk about his experience surviving the holocaust, join us at the museum to find out about how he handled the 1970s Neo-Nazi march in his adopted home of Skokie, IL. Take the afternoon to watch the documentary *Surviving Skokie*.

The film examines the circumstances surrounding the attempted 1970's Neo-Nazi march in Skokie, Illinois and the impact on its large Holocaust survivor population as told through the eyes of Jack Adler and his son Eli. *Surviving Skokie* portrays the human cost of racism and bigotry and the heroism of those who speak out against intolerance in all its forms. This film was a selection for the Denver Film Festival in 2015 and several other film festivals as well. The film will be shown in the Foote Gallery at the Loveland Museum and Gallery at 503 N. 
