

Spring Rains Success on Used Book Sale

Thanks to the enthusiasm of our patrons and the selfless work of our volunteers, we had another great spring sale! Buyers consistently tell us that our book sale stands out across the Front Range in organization, selection and quality. Despite rainy weather, patrons from all areas along the Front Range lined up inside the building and went for their favorite categories as soon as we opened. Their faithful and enthusiastic support resulted in a record breaking sale in terms of books sold and money earned for our library.

In preparation for our sale, volunteers sorted, packed, moved and arranged almost 50,000 books – a monumental task which proved well worth the effort. New innovations in the "bargain book box" program were wildly successful. 67% of our inventory found a home among the bookshelves of our loyal supporters. \$35,000 in profits from the sale will go directly to our library to bolster its invaluable programs and to help with equipment acquisition.




Loveland Loves To Read Presents Anthony Doerr!

Ticket sales are brisk in the first month of availability! You won't want to miss this extraordinary event. On **September 24**, Loveland Loves to Read hosts Anthony Doerr, Pulitzer Prize winner for *All the Light We Cannot See*. An outstanding speaker and an amazing book! Get your tickets early.

You can meet the author at our closed event at the Sweet Heart Winery, 5500 W. Highway 34, Loveland. Tickets are \$50 per person. This event will be open from 4:30-6:00 and includes a glass of wine or iced tea with hors d'oeuvres. Mr. Doerr will attend from 4:45-5:30. The author will not be signing books or providing autographs at this event.

Anthony Doerr will speak at the Roberta Price Auditorium, Thompson Valley High School, 1669 Eagle Drive, at 7:30 p.m. on **September 24**. After his presentation about his book and other writings, he will take questions from the audience and autograph books. There is a limit of 2 books per person.



Ticketing information is as follows: General admission: \$22. Preferred (front rows) seating: \$38. The event is all open seating, no reserved seats. To purchase tickets online, go to www.friendsofthelovelandlibrary.org.

Art in the Galleria

Have you noticed the current exhibit of 2- and 3- dimensional art in the five cases along the Library Galleria? The Art Selection Committee invites you to ponder these pieces and enjoy this strong quarterly show. Our current exhibition runs from April through June and features cast glass and steel wire butterfly balls by Reven Swanson, polycarbonate and wire mobiles by Barbara Baer and warm local scenes in oil from Kayo Peeler, all anchored by earthenware vases by Ft. Collins artist Paul Morris. The pieces are for sale with 20% of the price donated by the artist to the Friends in support of our library. One of Kayo Peeler's oils sold on the first day of the show!

Every three months, the Art Selection Committee installs new shows with pieces created by Colorado artists. All displayed art is selected the previous year through a competitive process. During the months of August, September, and October, artists are invited to submit their pieces for consideration through the CallforEntry.org (CaFE) website. Then in November jurors meet to select the pieces that will be shown the following year. The Art Selection Committee is comprised of six members from various library-affiliated groups.






Readmore Book Discussions


The Readmore Adult Book Groups meet on the first Tuesday of each month at 9 a.m. & at 6:30 p.m. and on the following Wednesday at 9 a.m. in the Erion Room. For questions, call Adult Services at 962-2402. Complete schedules are available at the Adult Services desk and are subject to change.

June 5 & 6 brings a return to one of the groups' favorite authors, Ann Patchett. In *Commonwealth*, a chance kiss sets in motion the upheaval of two families, which in turn becomes fodder for a best-selling novel. The novel entails a loss of privacy for both families who must come to terms with their tangled histories.



On **July 10** & **11**. Elie Wiesel's classic *Night* is an exploration of the author's guilt at having survived the holocaust as a teenager. This leads to an anguished questioning of God and the meaning of experience.

July 24 & 25 will be an extra session to explore the short stories of this year's Loveland Loves to Read author, Anthony Doerr. We will discuss selected stories from *The Shell Collector*.
