## **Spring Used Book Sale**

Thanks to all our faithful volunteers and patrons who helped to make our Spring Used Book Sale another successful fundraiser for the library! We had considerably fewer books this sale, but still brought in almost \$22,000 to contribute to library programs, equipment and events.

In all, 163 volunteers logged almost 3,200 hours in the last 6 months to collect, sort and pack the books, load them on trucks, set up the tables in the three days prior to the actual sale, then work the weekend sale. Thanks especially to our students who always contribute so willingly and cheerfully at our sales; to the guys who provided the muscle to load and unload the 1,247 boxes of books; to Barb Franke, our volunteer coordinator and Nancy DeLap, assistant volunteer coordinator; and to those who still had energy to help with the cleanup Sunday afternoon. We also would like to recognize our business friends: Book Haven, Book Lovers, Barnes & Noble, and Walmart Distribution Center.

Summer reading is a pleasure that I always thought was just for fun. Now I realize that it is very important to a child's development and success in school. Especially for beginning readers, the "summer slide" is very real so it is important to get them involved with literacy activities including the library's summer reading programs. The Children's Division puts lots of effort into making the program fun and rewarding without too many rules. Reading is its own reward but winning a book prize increases the value! This year's science-focused theme allows us to encourage nonfiction reading but it is not required. The three STEM Activity Days, June 2, July 1 and August 1, should be particularly enjoyable.

The public library is participating in a pilot outreach project this summer. Two local elementary school libraries that are a distance from the public library, Cottonwood Plains and B.F. Kitchen, will be open for four hours each week in June and July. Children living near these schools will be able to participate in our reading program.

As a busy working mom, it was hard to find time to read when my children were young but I kept reminding myself that I was setting a good example. The library's summer reading programs offer incentives and prizes for adults and teens as well as children so we hope to see the whole family at the library.




### **Farewell to Roberta**

## Digging for Gold in Colorado Libraries

The Loveland Library has now joined Prospector, the consortium of 42 libraries that provides free access to over 12 million books, CDs, DVDs, audiobooks and eBooks through a collective online catalog. Loveland library cardholders who do not find what

they want in our catalog, can easily search the Prospector catalog, place a hold on the title(s) and have them delivered to the Loveland hold shelf via a statewide courier. The Prospector

online catalog will also make unique Loveland Library items available to patrons at the other public and academic



libraries in Colorado and at the University of Wyoming. Look for the link on the library's catalog.

### **Summer Time, STEM Time**

The summer reading programs for children, teens and adults have science themes this year. STEM is short for science, technology, engineering and math, but also means fun ways to learn at the library.




## **Type Rider II**





### **New Genealogy Software**

The library has just added new genealogy software called World Vital Records. World Vital Records is accessible from home through the database page on the Loveland Public Library website. This new resource provides access to full census records from the censuses that are currently available to the public, 1790-1940. It also offers family trees that have been traced by other genealogists: a variety of baptism, marriage and death records for countries such as England, Australia, Norway and Sweden; and fun items such as high school yearbooks. This is great place to start your genealogical research if you can't get into the library to use our Ancestry.com.
