The Friends of the Loveland Public Library Spring Used Book Sale will be held **April 27-28**, in the Thomas M. McKee 4-H Building, at "The Ranch" Larimer County Fairgrounds and Events Complex, Interstate 25 and Crossroads Blvd., exit 259 in Loveland. The Members Only Preview Sale is on Friday, **April 26** from 4-8 p.m.

Over 60,000 books in 60+ categories, along with music CD's, movie DVD's, books on CD and cassette tape, and other non-book items will be on sale. Prices range from 25 cents to \$1.00 for Children's books, \$1.00 to \$2.50 for Teen and Adult books. The Vintage, Treasures and Collectibles books will be available at separate prices.

Children 12 years of age and younger attending the sale will be able to select a free book of their choice from the children's section.

As part of a "Going Green" effort, patrons are asked to bring their own paper, cloth, reusable shopping bags, and boxes. On Sunday for the \$5.00 Bag Sale, prices for these containers will be determined according to what a standard plastic grocery bag holds.

The 4-H Building has its own gravel parking lot adjacent to the building, with handicapped parking on the asphalt in front of the building. Patrons will be able to pull close to the building for loading of their purchases. Parking is free for this event.

A mandatory training class is required for all cashiers on the use of our new cash registers.

### **Success Brings Changes For Future Book Sales**

Due to the Friends' successful fundraising in support of the Loveland Public Library, we are now required to collect local and state sales tax during the book sales. Tax will be charged according to the rate set by local and state governments; that rate is currently 6.5% on all purchases.

Book dealers and organizations who have tax-exempt status, or a tax certificate for resale, <u>must provide a copy of their sales tax license or proof of dealership from the state</u> to the Friends of the Loveland Public Library Foundation, Inc. <u>prior to checking out.</u> Those who do not provide a copy of the document will be subject to paying sales tax when purchasing books.

In order to make this easier for volunteers and patrons, cash registers will be purchased and programmed with these tax requirements. Tally volunteers will still tally all purchases as they have in the past and cashiers will enter that amount into the cash register to figure the tax and total due.

All book sale cashiers and backup cashiers must attend a <u>mandatory training class</u> on operating the cash registers. All other book sale volunteers wanting to learn how to use the cash registers are welcome to attend. Training classes as will be provided as we get closer to the book sale.

#### **Volunteer Activity:**

The Friends of the Library 2012 Book Sale volunteer hours consisted of Friends of the Library members, our community friends, schoolchildren, local businesses, students, hospitals and our relatives.

Total volunteer hours logged for sorting books year round at The Sorting House on 10<sup>th</sup> Street, packing, loading and working at the Spring and Fall Book Sales at the Ranch amounted to 9,032 hours. The 2012 Book Sales were the most financially successful in the Friends' history. Online sales amounted to \$3,165. Expenses totaled \$4,112. Total net sales for 2012 were \$50,664.

The Loveland Loves To Read committee invited Alexander McCall Smith from Scotland to be the guest author for 2012. An afternoon reception for sponsors of the event was held at the library to meet the renowned author; he then entertained over 800 fans at the Roberta Price Auditorium in the evening. This was indeed a memorable event for our library. Forty volunteers worked 456 hours to make this event possible.

In its tenth year, the SweetNight Celebration entertained 180 people at the Chilson Senior Center. The silent auction netted **over \$3,000**. Improved lighting and newly purchased decorations enhanced the event. Eighty-nine SweetNight volunteers worked 526 hours to make this a memorable celebration for the Sweetheart City.

The Loveland Lights Celebration in its seventh year was truly a celebration! The two-day holiday event, held every year on the first weekend in December, proved to be another milestone in Friends' history. Attendance doubled the normal weekend patron count at the library – 2,013 visitors on Saturday and 948 visitors on Sunday. Adults and children made gingerbread houses. One hundred and fifty children took part in the "Find the Christmas Stocking" contest. Musical groups entertained, baked goods were sold and cooking demonstrations for special holiday foods were featured. A model railroad layout delighted children. Wood carvers, adult speakers and a children's church choir amid beautifully decorated Christmas trees made for a great weekend at the library. Forty volunteers dedicated 426 hours to make this holiday library tradition possible.

It is to the great credit of all of the Friends' volunteers and sponsors that all four fund-raising efforts for the library turned a profit in 2012.

In addition to the fund-raising events, FOLPL organization achieved the following in 2012:

- ♦ Changes were made to the FOL By-Laws to streamline policies and procedures.
- ♦ An in-house computer expert was hired to support our recently launched website.
- ◆ An Art Selection Committee was formed in partnership with the Library Advisory Board to select artwork to be exhibited in the cabinet display cases in the Galleria.
- ♦ Computer, desk and software were purchased for the Friends' office in the Library.
- ♦ *The Need to Know* newsletter was sent out bi-monthly via regular mail and email.



# Wanted: Citizen Interested in Advising Library

#### Message from Marcia

While we usually focus on upcoming library events, this is also a good time to mention some of the new or enhanced on-going services at the library.

Some changes to our main computer system now allow customers to place holds on items listed as available in the catalog. Holds can be placed on an available item just as you did before with items that were checked out. Staff will pull items daily and customers will get an email notice when the items are ready on the hold shelf. This may take some time so customers should not expect to find the requested item on the hold shelf until the notice is generated. When checking the catalog from outside the library, customers can now pay fines by credit card online so they are not blocked from renewing, placing holds or accessing databases. Persons without a library card can now apply for a temporary card online to place holds and access external databases. When you come in with proof of current address, a permanent card will be issued that will provide access to all library services.

Customers who need to borrow books from other libraries can now initiate requests online, without having to come into the library to complete the request form. The form is on the library's website at http://libra.loveland.lib.co.us/screens/ill.html. The library is a partner in SWIFT, a state interlibrary loan system. For information about interlibrary loan, contact 962-2588.

This has been a frustrating year for taxpayers seeking income tax forms. The library continues to be the only place in Loveland that provides free federal and state income tax forms and the staff has fielded many questions about the delays in receiving the federal forms and instruction booklets. While library staff cannot answer specific tax questions, they will assist in locating the needed information here or online.

The City's Visual Arts Commission and The Art in Public Places program have placed seven twodimensional art pieces in the library's Galleria. These paintings, all by Colorado artists, will be on display through November. The Library's Art Selection Committee will be placing four quarterly exhibits in the glass display cases in the Galleria this year. Sculptures by Rosetta and photographs by Jamie Bolane and Kent Gunnufson are on display in March. A new show will be on display in April with an artists' reception on Friday, April 12 from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. during downtown's Night on the Town.

The library has a large glass case in the Galleria where individuals and organizations may display collections or artifacts for one month. If you are interested in sharing your objects, contact Joan in Customer Service for more information. Recent exhibits have included a PEZ collection, arrowheads, model trains and teddy bears. A new display case in the Children's Division will display collections from local children too.






