Spring Book Sale Success


April 26, 27, and 28 marked another successful fundraiser for the Friends of the Loveland Library. Our semi-annual book sales are always well-attended, and the shoppers are consistently impressed by the selection, organization and prices of our books. This Spring sale we set out 1,584 boxes of books and non-book items (such as puzzles, games, DVD's and CD's), all categorized and alphabetized to make it easier to find that special title or author. Volunteers racked up over 1,200 hours during the week: loading the trucks, setting up, running the sale, and cleaning up afterwards. Though the final sales figures are not yet available, the attendance and purchases clearly indicate that books are still a popular choice, in spite of all the e-readers.

Volunteers will begin collecting, sorting and packing for the next sale, which is **October 25-27**. Donations are accepted year-round at the Sorting Place, 1010 W. 10th Street. Book drop bins are provided by the entrance door, or you may bring them on Wednesdays from 9 a.m.-3p.m. when staff is available to help unload. We do not accept business, computer or text-books more than 3 years old, Reader's Digest Condensed Books, encyclopedias, magazines, VHS movies or music cassette tapes.

Many volunteers are needed throughout the year and especially the week of the sale to make our book sales successful. If you are interested in helping, please contact Barbara Franke at 203-0904 or




Loveland Loves to Read Celebrates Ten Years

Friday, **September 20** 7 to 9 p.m., Rialto Theater

Saturday, **September 21** 10:00 a.m. to noon, Chilson Senior Center

Tom Franklin and his novel, Crooked Letter, Crooked Letter, have been selected as Loveland Loves to Read's tenth annual community read. Mr. Franklin will speak at the Rialto on Friday, September 20 at 7 p.m.



Crooked Letter, Crooked Letter, set in rural Mississippi, begins with the secret friendship of two boys. Larry Ott, a middle class white boy, befriends Silas Jones, the son of a poor black mother. The boys share a special bond until Larry's father intervenes in a cruel and unexpected way. Silas goes on to become a high school baseball star and Larry reverts to his reclusive ways. The night that teen-age Larry takes a girl for a first date to a drive-in movie ends in disaster. The girl disappears and no trace is found. The people of the town assume that Larry is responsible, although he is never indicted. Larry has been shunned for over twenty years, and now another teenage girl has gone missing.

Larry is the prime suspect and Silas is the town's only law enforcement officer.

Franklin, who was born in Mississippi and spent part of his childhood in Alabama, has been praised for his unique southern voice and his inspired storytelling abilities. His literary achievements include the Edgar Award, The Los Angeles Times Book Award, the CWA Gold Dagger Award, and a Guggenheim Fellowship. He is writer in residence at the University of Mississippi, where his wife, essayist and poet Beth Ann Fennelly, is also a member of the faculty.

On Saturday morning, **September 21** at 10 a.m., both Franklin and Fennelly will speak at a brunch at the Chilson Senior Center. They are looking forward to the publication of a novel, their first collaboration, in October.

Fennelly's poetry collections and Franklin's other stories and novels are available as well.

The May topic is Master of the Steppe: Mountain Plover. Appropriate for bird lovers of all ages. 962-2401.




Feed and Grain Memories Project





One Book 4 Colorado

One Book 4 Colorado will occur again from **May 6 - 20!** Through this project, Loveland Public Library and many other libraries will be giving away copies of the same book to every 4 year old. Children should stop by the Children's service desk to receive their books.

The Story Behind One Book 4 Colorado

Every year thousands of children in Colorado enter kindergarten with below grade level reading skills. Research shows that children from low-income families have few to no books in their homes and are exposed to 30 million fewer words before the age of four than their higher-income peers.

If left unchecked, these factors contribute to literacy gaps which increase as children struggle to make the transition from learning to read to reading to learn.

In an effort to address this critical issue, Lt. Gov. Joe Garcia's office partnered with Reach Out and Read Colorado, the Colorado State Library, public libraries, the private sector, and nonprofit communities to bring the Denver Preschool Program's successful Preschool One Book, One Denver program to all of Colorado.

Introduced as part of Colorado Reads: The Early Literacy Initiative, One Book 4 Colorado fosters a culture of literacy by getting a book into the home of every four-year-old in Colorado.

Now in its second year, One Book 4 Colorado is preparing to distribute more than 70,000 books at public libraries and Reach Out and Read Colorado clinics across the state, along with Denver Preschool Program preschools in Denver.

The book will be provided in both English and Spanish and will be available to children with special needs. The year's finalists are: Duck on a Bike by David Shannon; Knuffle Bunny: A Cautionary Tale by Mo Willems; and Chicka Chicka Boom Boom by Bill Martin Jr. and John Archambault.


