Loveland Lights to Return in 2012






YOU CAN'T STRETCH A BRICK!

Library News

Construction Changes - Part 2

In mid- November, renovation of the old building will move from the north to the south side of the building, which means the adult book collection will be moved. The north portion that includes the local history and business areas as well as the media, reference and fiction collections will be completed.

The current schedule anticipates that adult collections will not be available to the public from **November 9 – 18** while the collections are moved. Readers as well as CD listeners and DVD viewers are encouraged to stock up before that week. The fiction and media collections should be open again after the **18**th if not sooner.

From **November 18** until the end of the construction in January, the non-fiction book collection will have limited public access. The biggest inconvenience will be the "closed stacks" which means the adult nonfiction collection will be stored on temporary carts packed close together and the public will not be able to browse the shelves. Library staff and

volunteers will retrieve requested items from storage. Contact Assistant Director Marcia Lewis (962-2404) if you can volunteer between mid-November and early January to be a greeter or a "go-fer."



Starting **November 10**, access to the library will be through the new entrance on the southwest side of the building. The new automated book return and sorter will be installed in November and soon thereafter, two new returns, a drive up and a walk up, will be open. The art in the stairwell should be installed in December.



While the final completion date is still vague, everyone is busy planning for the Grand Re-opening celebration in mid-February. Visit the library often to see the progress and save the week of **February 17 – 23** for the festivities!



The programs and activities in the new children's area and the teenseen are well underway. Children, parents and library staff love the new Mrs. Runschmunkel's Reading Room for storytimes and other events. Young children are quickly learning how to use the new computers with pre-selected games and stories.

Computer users in the iExplore lab are glad to access a computer without wait time. Classes are now being offered in the iLearn classroom.

Book discussions and other adult programs are now held in the Erion Foundation Community Room on the second floor while the Gertrude Scott Meeting Room is being renovated.

p.m. (an extra session), Tuesday, November 1 at 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. and Wednes-





State Award

Poudre Valley Health Systems (PVHS) Healthy Kids Club received the Library Community Partnership Award at the Colorado Association of Libraries conference which was held in Loveland in October. This award recognizes achievements in planning and implementing collaborative library programs or services between a Colorado library and a business, organization, group, or individual. Since

the spring of 2009, PVHS, **Loveland Housing** Authority, and the Loveland Public Library have cooperated to provide a free, on-site, after-school learning program for 2 ½ hours three days per week for elementary age children living in Maple Terrace Apartments, a subsidized housing complex in Loveland. When the "The Kids Club" evolved into an inter-agency collaborative project, the efforts to empower young children to choose lifelong literacy and healthy lifestyle in their home and community became more comprehensive and effective.



PVHS also provided funds for book prizes for the library's 2011 summer reading program. Cynthia Slosson, the library's youth outreach librarian, and Marcia Lewis, Assistant Library Director, nominated PVHS for the award to honor this successful partnership.




