Anthony Doerr Wows 2018 Loveland Loves to Read

“Amazing!” “Inspiring!” “Such compassion and depth!” “What an incredible mind explosion!” “Humorous, powerful, personable!” These were some of the comments from the audience who attended the Loveland Loves to Read program on September 24. Anthony Doerr’s Pulitzer Prize winning novel *All the Light We Cannot See* was our choice for the *One Book, One Community Read*, and all of Loveland anxiously awaited the chance to meet the man who authored such a brilliant, unforgettable book. His presentation exceeded all expectations.

Doerr shared his amazing journey that led to his success as a writer. From his first book written at age 8 through an insatiable curiosity in his youth, the author found his career choice changed with every book he read. In college, he embraced the opportunity to take courses in every discipline and was accused of being a dilettante when he refused to declare a major. He was not discouraged and continued to pursue an eclectic curriculum while still managing to graduate.



The enthusiasm and energy that Doerr displayed in his talk continued during the question and answer time. Afterward, those who waited patiently for their books to be autographed were rewarded with a personal, gracious connection as the author thanked each for coming. He encouraged students, praised teachers, and gave advice to aspiring writers.

This is the fifteenth year for Loveland Loves to Read and certainly one of our most memorable and successful. We are indebted to the Friends of the Loveland Library for their ongoing support, with an extra special thanks to Lisa Blankenship, co-president of the Board, for all the hours she contributed to coordinate ticket sales. We would like to recognize Barbara Haynes and Book Haven for promoting our program and for selling books at the event. Thanks to the Sweetheart Winery for providing a warm, intimate setting for a Meet and Greet with Doerr before his Author Talk. Each person who attended left with a lasting memory of having met someone very special. Thanks also to the Thompson Valley High School theater staff who did an excellent job with the set-up and sound for the evening.

We are so grateful to our generous sponsors and donors who contributed over and above to help bring such an outstanding author to Loveland. And thanks to all the volunteers—TVHS students, members of the Friends and others who made everything go smoothly.

And finally, we thank the community who supports our program with its attendance, enthusiasm and feedback. We are proud to be a part of a community who loves a great book, enjoys discussing it, and is excited about meeting the author.

Pajama Night at the Library

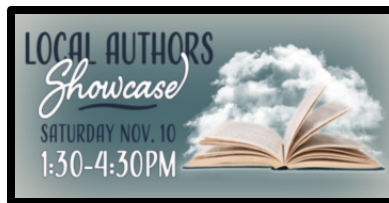
Read Aloud Loveland is hosting Pajama Night at the Library on Tuesday **October 16** at 6:30 p.m. Preschoolers are invited to come to the library in their pj's and hear a story. Each family will receive a free copy of *Bear is Not Tired* by Ciara Gavin. Families are welcome. Children must be accompanied by an adult.

Symphony! Music Presentation and Lecture Series

On Monday, **October 8** at 6:30 p.m., you can learn about Brahms Symphony #3 "Scottish." There is a wistful introduction that evokes the wind-swept highlands - somber and serious - culminating with roiling gathering storm clouds. The bouncing "reel" of the second movement lightens the mood.

Tuesday, **November 12** at 6:30 p.m., the Library presents Schubert Symphony # 4: Tragic. The slow introduction portrays the work's nickname and then its fast section is pushed ahead by an accented off-beat melody with tearing glissandos. It lives up to Schubert's reputation as a wonderful writer of melody.

Local Authors Showcase



On **November 10**, the Loveland Public Library will host the Fourth Annual Local Authors Showcase. To continue our passionate advocacy for literacy and lifelong learning, the library will once again bring together a community of new and established authors, small business owners, publishing companies, e-book authors, local writers groups and avid readers. The morning workshop will provide an opportunity for local authors to hone their skills through expert panel presentations and the afternoon is open to the public. Starting at 1:30 p.m., 50 local authors will showcase their crafts in the Library Galleria, network with others in the publishing field, and sell their goods directly to the book-loving public. Come browse, visit, discuss, shop. You might leave with a Christmas gift or two signed by a talented local author.

In preparation for our local authors' weekend, the Library is offering two workshops open to the public. On **October 10**, at 9 a.m., Jamie Raintree will provide help to budding authors. Are you an author in need for a website? Have an author's webpage but want to update? Please join us for a class that will teach you the fundamentals of creating an author's website.

Want to write that novel but don't know where to begin? Join Chuck Barrett for a writing workshop that will get you started. On Saturday, **October 20** at 9 a.m., Chuck Barrett will be helping authors initiate characterization, plots, and settings. Additionally, he will provide tips on the writing process. Día De Los Muertos: A Cultural Celebration



Join us at the Library to celebrate the Fourth Annual Día de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) in partnership with Loveland's League of United Latin American Citizens, the Loveland Museum, the Rialto Theater, Resthaven Funeral Home, SummitStone, LatinX and our local community partners. This is a celebration of one of Mexico's most important holidays. It honors the dead with festivals and lively celebrations that combine Aztec rituals with Catholicism brought to Mexico by Spanish conquistadores. The most familiar symbol of Día de los Muertos may be the *calacas* and *calaveras* (skeleton and skulls). They are almost always portrayed as enjoying life.

The celebration at the Library begins on Sunday, **November 4**. Enjoy Mariachi singers, traditional Aztec dancers, sugar skull decorating, face painting and other family activities -- and Mexican food! We will also show a short film, *La Fuerza Interna* by José Chalit.

This year's celebrations also include a José Posada exhibit at the Loveland Museum, running from **November through January 13, 2019**. Wandering Botanist

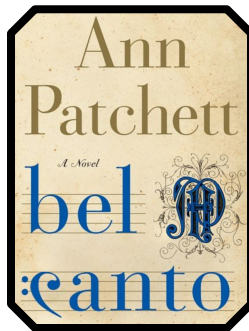

Readmore Book Discussion

The Readmore Book Discussion meets on the first Tuesday of each month at 9 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. and on the following Wednesday at 9 a.m. On **October 2 & 3**, the group will discuss *Bel Canto* by Ann Patchett. This is a poignant and at times, very funny novel about Latin terrorists who storm an international gathering hosted by an underprivileged country. The purpose of the gathering is to promote foreign interest and trade. Sadly, the terrorists learn that their intended target, the President, has stayed home to watch his favorite soap opera on TV.



On **November 6 and 7**, the discussion will be about *Moon Tiger* by Penelope Lively. In this novel, Claudia Hampton, writer of best-selling popular history books, lies in a London hospital bed and looks back on her own life, including an unforgettable love affair.

Buzzwords Book Group

Join the Library's non-fiction book discussion on Thursday, **October 11** at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Shark Drunk* by Morten Strøksnes.

The Lofoten islands in Norway are as isolated and forbidding as they are majestic. In this true story, two friends, the author and the eccentric artist, set out onto the icy waters surrounding the islands. Their quest: to pursue the infamous Greenland shark—a massive creature that can grow to twenty-six feet in length and more than a ton in weight—from a tiny rubber boat. The shark is not known for its size alone: its meat contains a toxin that, when consumed, has been known to make people drunk and hallucinate.

On Thursday **November 8** at 6:30 p.m., come ready to look at the *Year of Voting Dangerously* by Maureen Dowd. Trapped between two candidates with the highest recorded unfavorable ratings, Americans are plunged into this perilous and shocking campaign season. The *New York Times* columnist traces the psychologies and pathologies of one of the nastiest and most significant battles of the sexes ever. Dowd has covered Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton since the 1990s.

Remembering World War I

Join the Loveland Public Library as it celebrates the centennial of the World War I Armistice with a series of events.

On Friday, **November 2** at 4 p.m., Dr. Robert Gudmestad will speak about the history of the doughboys, including their training, their experience in France, and their overall importance to the war efforts.

On Saturday, **November 3**, our second event takes place at the Loveland Museum. Dr. Patricia Limerick will provide an informal conversation examining how Colorado contributed to World War I.

Thursday, **November 8** at 6:30 p.m., the Library will present Jim Found's discussion of World War I and Classical Music. This special program examines how music changed from the beginning of the war to its end. There will be a variety of pieces played from early patriotic tunes to the songs that reflect the dissonance felt by people of the time.

The final program in this series is on Friday, **November 9** at 4 p.m., and focuses on the Western Front. We will visit key sites with narrator Jay Harding as he guides us through battlefields and underground trenches, as well as air shows featuring World War I fighters and monuments that honor the fallen.

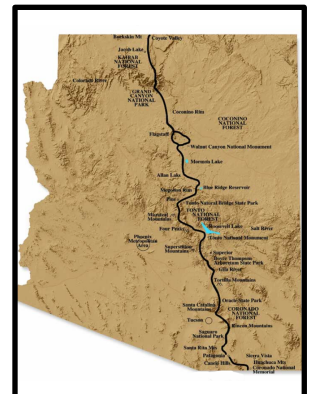
The Mosaic of World Religions

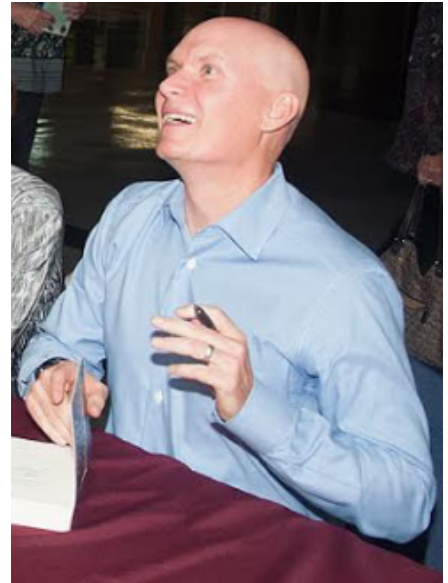

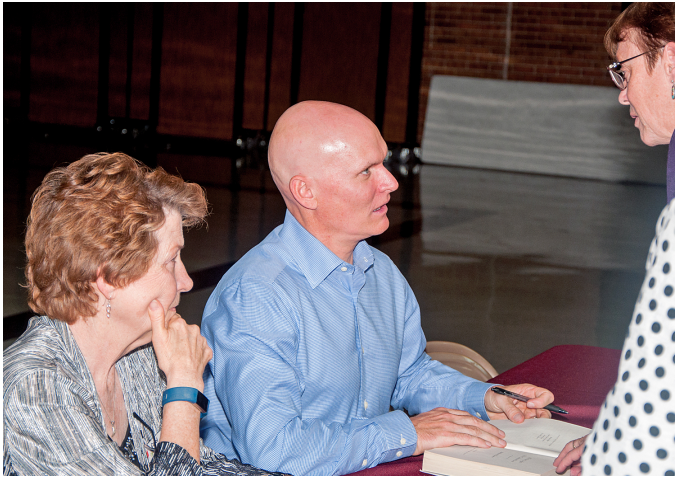
